# Why Restore Beaches?

- Florida depends on its 825 miles sandy shoreline to protect infrastructure from storms, provide critical habitat, and provide recreational and economic opportunities
- 422.7 miles designated as critically eroded
- 253.1 miles restored and maintained
- Beach management generates a \$5.4 return for every \$1 investment of state's expenditures





# **Statutory Authority**

Chapter 161, Florida Statutes

- Develop and implement a comprehensive, long-range, statewide beach management plan for erosion control; beach preservation, restoration and nourishment; and storm and hurricane protection
  - Critical Erosion Report
  - Strategic Beach Management Plan
  - Inlet Management Plan
  - Long-Range Budget Plan
  - Local Government Funding Request





## **Shoreline Eligibility**

#### State Funding

- Designated as critically eroded by the department
- Proposed strategies consistent with the Strategic Beach Management
   Plan or Inlet Management Plan
- Monitoring work required by state and federal permit
- State cost share percentage calculated by public access pursuant to Rule 62B-36, F.A.C.






#### **State Funding**

Local Government Funding Request

- Since 1998, Florida Legislature has dedicated over \$932 million
  - \$109 million for hurricane recovery projects





## **State Funding**

Local Government Funding Request

- Annual funding requests for local government-sponsored beach and inlet projects
  - Feasibility studies
  - Design and permitting
  - Construction of erosion-control structures, engineered sand placement, and any associated project mitigation
  - Post-construction biological and physical monitoring





# **State Funding**

Rule Amendment

- **Beach and inlet projects evaluated** pursuant to Rule 62B-36.006, F.A.C.
- 2019 statutory changes amended project ranking criteria



- Notice of Rule Development: Oct. 7, 2019
- Public Workshops: Dec. 2019, Feb. 2020, Apr. 2020
- Notice of Proposed Rule: June 30, 2020
- Rule effective date: Aug. 26, 2020





Statutory Changes

#### **Beach Projects: New**

**Considers tourism-related** impacts, value of upland property, dune addition, total amount of previous state funding, accessible beach area, successive requests, environmental habitat enhancement, easements acquired, and Erosion Control Line established





Statutory Changes

#### **Beach Projects: Existing**

**Considers federal** involvement, storm damage reduction benefits, cost-effectiveness, recreational benefits, mitigation of inlet effects, sand placement volumes, and readiness to construct





Statutory Changes

#### **Inlet Projects: New**

- Considers increased bypassing improvements, cost-effectiveness of using inlet sand, enhanced longevity of proximate beach projects, active permits, federal funds available, and total amount of previous state funding
- 75% state cost share for construction of initial major inlet management project component





Statutory Changes

#### **Inlet Projects: Existing**

 Considers sand reaching the inlet, severity of erosion, balancing the sediment budget, Inlet Management Plans, and secured local funds





#### **Rule Effects**

#### FY 2021-22 Project Evaluations

- Department staff conducted trial project rankings throughout rulemaking process
  - Refine calculation and scoring methods
  - Consider a variety of funding requests by project type and geographic location

#### Guidance for Local Government Funding Requests: Ranking Criteria for Beach and Inlet Management Projects

Updated to include 2020 amendments to Chapter 62B-36, Florida Administrative Code. A discussion of statutory and rule authority for ranking criteria and practical methods used by Division staff for the award of ranking points to beach and inlet management projects for determining priority listing in the annual Local Government Funding Request submitted to the Governor and Legislature.



- Public workshops and open comment periods allowed stakeholders opportunity to provide feedback on proposed amendments and gain better understanding of rule effects
- Adopted 2020 Rule conforms with statutory intent and the program's statewide and long-range beach management plan
- Guidance document for annual funding request
